Principal's Message



Dear Johnnies Community,

This weekend marks the 42nd Anniversary of the Foundation of our relocation "on the hill" in 1979 at Perwillowen Road. At our assembly, I reminded the students of this and the fact that we were originally established here as St. Joseph's College. We changed our name to St. John's

College in 1985 and the Good Samaritan Sisters provided us with this name, and our college motto, "Unbind and Set Free", based on the words of Jesus as he called Lazarus from the grave:

...., he cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, here. Come out!" The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go free." (John 11: 43-44)

I have attached some photos of 1979 for your perusal. The Principal at the time was Kathleen Rundall. The pictures show the building of the large water tank, which still exists today under the tuckshop seating area, the first Passion play up the hill, the first King and Queen of the Mountain, members of the Cross-country team, and one of the first year 8 classes. The school began its journey "on the hill" with 100 students.

We have nearly completed our interviews for Year 7, 2022. It has again been a great privilege to meet so many wonderful and talented young people wishing to join the Johnnies community. I have reacquainted myself with some parents and been introduced to many new ones.

Thank you to all our current parents and students for speaking so highly of the school to many Johnnies aspirants, this augers well for the continued tradition and growth of this great college.

Catholic Perspectives – Empathy and sensitivity

The Year 9 HPE Curriculum contains a section entitled Emotions, which are an essential part of being in a relationship. It goes on to explain that “the maturing of the physical body does not happen in isolation from the emotional, relational and spiritual dimension. Emotion is the link that connects the mind, body and spirit and provides the foundation of our ability to understand ourselves and relate to others with empathy and sensitivity. Burying, denying or suppressing emotions can lead to mental, physical, relational and spiritual unwellness (Pert, 1997). However, when well understood and directed responsibly, emotions can bring us closer together reflecting the true nature of our connectedness”. This week’s background information is on empathy and sensitivity.



Empathy and sensitivity

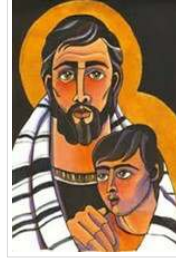
Compassion or Empathy describes the human ability to 'suffer with' someone else. Derived from Latin Passio, the English word Passions is the term classically used in the Catholic tradition for feelings or emotions. Passions denote how we are affected by events, people and actions and how we are moved to respond emotionally in some way. So 'com-passion' means 'with-feeling'. Affective maturity entails being aware of, understanding, and correctly acting upon one's own emotions. Affective maturity also involves having a well-developed ability to know how others feel. A life lived wholeheartedly is a life in which compassion plays an important role. Healthy relationships require us to be sensitive to how our words and actions affect other people. If the goal of life itself is human flourishing, then it has to be a goal for all people. So, the ways in which we think, speak and act have implications for how other people feel and view themselves, their own dignity as persons, and the worth of the world around them. Pope Saint John Paul II, in an interpretation of the second account of creation found in Genesis, talks about the original solitude of the first human being. John Paul II argues that this original solitude or 'alone-ness', is something which is true for every human being and their existence as human persons. The human being is different from every other being in God's Creation. The human being alone is a rational being. John Paul II also points out, however, that this self-awareness of difference from the rest of Creation is the necessary condition for the recognition of other human beings as beings like oneself. Therefore, we could say that compassion, the ability to feel with other people, is something that arises out of our own sense of being alone. We cannot really feel what other people feel. We can only feel what we believe they could be feeling. This step requires us to acknowledge that others are somehow like us and at the same time are radically different from us because each human being is a unique and original subject. We are each 'alone' whilst simultaneously always already 'together'. Compassion is the key human ability that binds these solitary beings into a community that works together to achieve their mutual flourishing and happiness. A life lived wholeheartedly is only possible as a life lived together.

St Joseph's Day

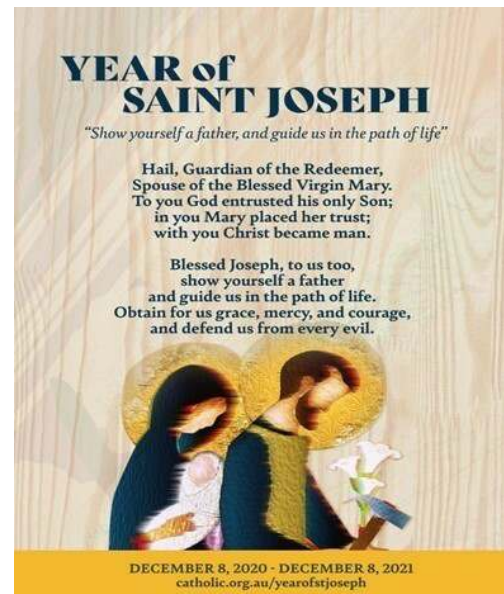
Today we celebrate the feast day of St Joseph's Father of Jesus

NAPLAN Online – Information for Parents and Carers

All students in Years 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual *National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy* (NAPLAN). NAPLAN assesses skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students will be tested in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN testing is conducted in May. recreational based tourism on the island's biophysical health. Students collected a diverse array of primary data and were grateful to hear firsthand knowledge about island management through a Queensland Parks and Wildlife Officer and a Butchulla Ranger. The field trip gave students an opportunity to investigate the island's World Heritage Listed features and gain an understanding of effective management strategies that successfully balance recreation with conservation.

Back in the classroom, students will now analyse their primary data in order to propose a strategy that addresses the anthropogenic impacts that were identified as challenges in relation to beach camping. Designed for both ATAR and Non-ATAR Year 12 students, the University Showcase is a travelling roadshow of representatives from Queensland Universities, TAFE Queensland and the Australian Defence Force. The Showcase visits schools to deliver course information, answer questions, and provide a career market experience. The students had access to a wide range of tertiary education providers (all in one place) and received valuable information to prepare for life after high school.

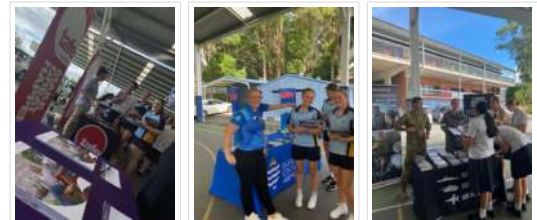
